### Newsletter supplement: Prescribing Silk Garments in Primary Care for Eczema

## Summary

- Three brands of knitted silk garments are currently listed in the Drug Tariff; Dermasilk<sup>®</sup>, Dreamskin<sup>®</sup>, and Skinnies<sup>®</sup>. All three brands have a wide range of garments available in various sizes e.g. vests, pyjamas.
- These garments are relatively expensive and the available evidence to support their use is weak. Current evidence is from case studies and poor quality trials.<sup>1.</sup> Their use may be beneficial for a small number of patients in exceptional circumstances (see below) when all other options have been considered.
- Silk garments should only be prescribed by those who have expertise in managing patients with moderate/severe eczema and who have experience in dressing techniques e.g. dermatology consultants, dermatology specialist nurses and GPs with a special interest in eczema.
- Patients should be reviewed regularly to assess efficacy.

#### Silk garments should only be prescribed in the following circumstances

- The treatment of moderate or severe eczema in patients for whom standard therapy with emollients, topical steroids and occlusive dressings has failed to achieve control of the condition.
- Situations where wet wrapping with elasticated viscose stockinette garments has been unsuccessful <u>or</u> contraindicated (e.g. due to recurrent secondary infection).
- The management of severe pruritus in atopic patients which is poorly responsive to antihistamines and environmental manipulation.
- The management of pruritus which is causing sleep disturbance/impact on family life/ missing school.



#### How Many Sets are Appropriate?



- Initially **only ONE SET** of garments should be prescribed to ensure fit and comfort.
- If effective, **then one further set** could be prescribed to allow washing. After washing according to the manufacturer's instructions, these garments are extremely quick-drying.
- Care should be taken to select correct item/size and size/product code should be clearly written on each prescription. Waste occurs if incorrect sizes are prescribed /supplied as often these garments are non-refundable.
- It is currently unclear how long garments will last, although manufacturers' websites state they can be washed repeatedly.
- For children: with care the garments will only need to be replaced when outgrown by the child, therefore they should <u>not</u> be added as "repeats".

#### **Action for Community Pharmacists**

#### **Pharmacy Staff Should**

- Double-check size/item required with patient/carer <u>before</u> ordering
- Double-check with prescriber if seemingly inappropriate quantity or size has been prescribed for an individual patient confusion can occur when selecting/printing from clinical system
- Clarify size with patient/carer **<u>before</u>** packs are opened.

#### Patient Information

- When used in combination with medical creams and ointments, care should be taken to ensure that the medication is fully absorbed into the skin **before** the silk clothing is worn.
- Silk garments are **not suitable** for use in direct contact with emollients used in 'wet wrapping techniques'.<sup>2</sup>
