
HSC Health and Social Care Board **April 2014 GENERIC PRESCRIBING** In Northern Ireland

Well done to prescribers for continuing to contribute to the increasing generic rate across Northern Ireland.

Focus on Ebixa[®] loss of patent

Generic memantine tablets became available in February 2014. Switching of all remaining branded Ebixa® tablets to generic memantine tablets would result in efficiency savings in excess of £100k annually across Northern Ireland.

Action for Prescribers

Please consider switching all branded Ebixa[®] tablets to the generic memantine tablets.

Focus on Xalatan[®] switch Background

Latanoprost eye drops became available generically during 2013. Even so, this drug is still often prescribed as the branded product, costing the NHS an additional **£180,000** annually.

Examination of the SPCs of generic latanoprost shows that the formulation of these products is identical or very similar to that of the original formulation of Xalatan[®].

Storage Requirements

In 2013 the Xalatan[®] brand was re-formulated to allow storage at room temperature, although the shelf life was reduced from 3 years to 2 years. Generic formulations must be stored in the fridge until opened but may be stored at room temperature during the four weeks in which the bottle is in use.

Action for Prescribers

Please consider switching all branded Xalatan[®] to the generic latanoprost eye drops.

Prescribers are reminded to look at page 3 of their practice's Compass report each quarter to see if there are any brands that could be switched to the generic equivalent. Switch support materials can be accessed on the primary care intranet under "Pharmacy and Medicines Management, Clinical Resources, Generics". Practices should highlight to their MMAs any particular difficulties associated with implementing these switches to see if a solution can be found.

Reminders

- DHSSPS Policy Generic medicines should be prescribed in preference to branded products in all appropriate circumstances irrespective of whether a generic medicine is currently available. This will ensure full utilisation of generic medicines when branded medicines come 'off-patent'.
- Practices should ensure generic medicines are prescribed in preference to branded products in all appropriate circumstances.
- Generic Prescribing remains the single most effective way to generate savings for the Health Service.
- Practices are encouraged to search for all brands listed in this newsletter and ensure that these products are switched to generic even if a generic product is not yet available, so savings can be made as soon as the generic price drops.
- It is important to ensure that patients are made aware of any proposed changes to their medication — support materials are available on the primary care intranet.
- Community pharmacists should be made aware of any planned generic switches to allow for stock adjustment and to ensure that patients are counselled about the change at dispensing.
